
of Black women believe it is not the time to retreat, but to protect our rights and build a collective future. Black women have long been the canaries in the coal mine. In our 2024 poll, they named protecting democracy, creating an economy of opportunity for all, and improving public education as the top issues facing our day to day lives *and* the future.

In 2025, the call is louder. This year's polling reveals a painful truth from the perspectives of Black women voters: we are retreating from a future where everyone can thrive.

AN UNPRECEDENTED MAJORITY OF BLACK WOMEN VOTERS ARE STRONGLY DISSATISFIED WITH THE DIRECTION OF AMERICA.

Satisfaction with the direction of the country has plummeted since our 2021 polling.

In 2021, 58% of Black women voters were satisfied with the direction of the country. A meager 8% are satisfied today.




SATISFACTION WITH THE DIRECTION OF THE COUNTRY HAS PLUMMETED

"Disappointed" and "Going Backwards"


FEELINGS ABOUT STATE OF THE COUNTRY



...AND ARE FEELING EVEN MORE PESSIMISTIC NOW THAN THEY WERE DURING THE HEIGHT OF COVID-19 INSTABILITY IN 2021.

There is an undeniable retreat in their feelings of economic stability and mobility.

Attitudes about the economy have collapsed. Today, pessimism about the economy is nearly universal at 87% – <u>a 54% increase</u> <u>from 2021.</u>



ECONOMIC CONDITIONS ARE GETTING WORSE

THE IMPACT GOES BEYOND WALLETS: 45% SAY THEIR MENTAL HEALTH HAS GOTTEN WORSE.

Black women voters who have experienced a decline in their mental health over the past year name the current state of the country and cost of living as the top reasons why.




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A CRISIS OF ECONOMIC HOPE.

Black women are sounding the alarm, not only about their own economic experiences, but about the nation's trajectory.


Feelings about the economy worsening have sharply increased from 40% in 2024 to 87% 2025.



BLACK WOMEN ARE FEELING FURTHER BEHIND ECONOMICALLY THAN SINCE OUR FIRST POLL IN 2021.


Most Black women voters say they are falling behind financially: 57% say their pay is falling behind, an increase of 20% since last year.

This concern is particularly evident among non-college voters: 62% of non college voters say their pay is falling behind.




EVERY DAY WORRIES IN 2025

AND IT'S NOT JUST ABOUT TODAY'S PAYCHECK...



BLACK WOMEN CURRENTLY WORRY MORE ABOUT THEIR ECONOMIC SITUATION THAN DURING THE HEIGHT OF COVID INSTABILITY IN 2021-2022.



Black women are experiencing a spike in immediate here-and-now concerns like debt, paying bills, and losing their jobs. More Black women (54%) worry nearly every day about paying routine and rising bills. This has risen since our 2022 polling, when 44% of Black women shared this worry.



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THERE ARE SIGNIFICANT BARRIERS TO OPPORTUNITY AND ECONOMIC MOBILITY...

Black women are experiencing a daily erosion of economic stability, trust, and hope—and they see the root causes clearly.

Two forces top the list of obstacles to economic success and mobility for all: a rigged economy and the persistence of racism.

OBSTACLES TO ECONOMIC MOBILITY

- **38%** An unfair or rigged economic system
- **32%** Racism and discrimination
- **23%** Lack of good paying job opportunities
- 21% Actions / policies of current government


Black women voters impacted by federal job cuts

either directly, through a family member, or close friend – further impacting feelings of the economy worsening.


Black women voters overwhelmingly disapproved of proposed or enacted policies in 2025 that are anticipated to further impact pathways to opportunity and economic mobility.



These non-partisan findings come at a critical time in our country where the data across national polls show there are significant and life-altering rollbacks that are putting our future at stake *and* our day to day lives.

Our polling is no different - with 55% of Black women believing it is not the time to retreat, but to protect our rights and build a collective future. **So, where do we go from here?**

BLACK WOMEN ARE CALLING FOR LEADERS TO PRIORITIZE FAIRNESS, THREATS TO OUR ECONOMIC FUTURE, AND THEIR RIGHTS.

As the headlines continue to shift, **the throughline in our findings is unmistakable**: **Black women are navigating rising economic anxiety.** Black women are calling not for urgency born of crisis, but for structural solutions grounded in care. They are clear – <u>just</u> <u>as in our previous polls</u> – that strengthening the social safety net for all, protecting democracy, improving the economy, and defending bodily autonomy must be prioritized by all leaders.

Methodology

These findings are from a proprietary survey conducted by brilliant corners Research & Strategies on behalf of The Highland Project. This is a survey of 701 African American women who are registered to vote. The survey was conducted by phone using professional interviewers starting on May 1st and ending on May 8th, 2025.

The survey's sample was drawn randomly from the voter file and and is representative of African American women nationwide. The data was weighted slightly to adhere to population demographics of voters in the voter file. The margin of error overall is +/- 3.7 percent, with a 95 percent confidence interval. Notably, the margin of error for sub-groups will be higher depending on the size of the sub-group sample and the size of the actual response to any given question.
