



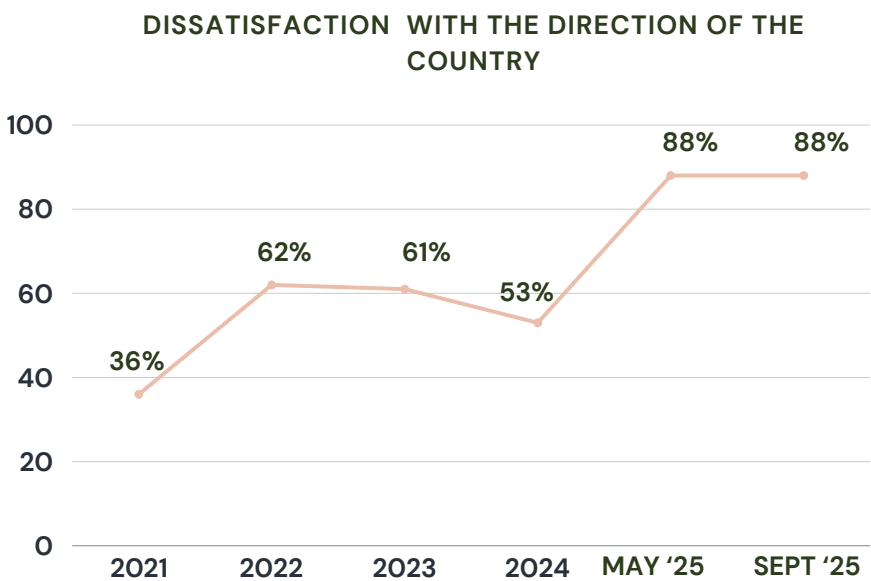
FALL 2025 POLL OF BLACK WOMEN VOTERS IN AMERICA

BLACK WOMEN VOTERS’ DISSATISFACTION WITH THE COUNTRY REMAINS AT A HISTORIC HIGH.

An overwhelming majority of Black women voters are not happy with the direction of the country.

Since our polling began in 2021, dissatisfaction with the direction of the country has increased by 52% for Black women voters.

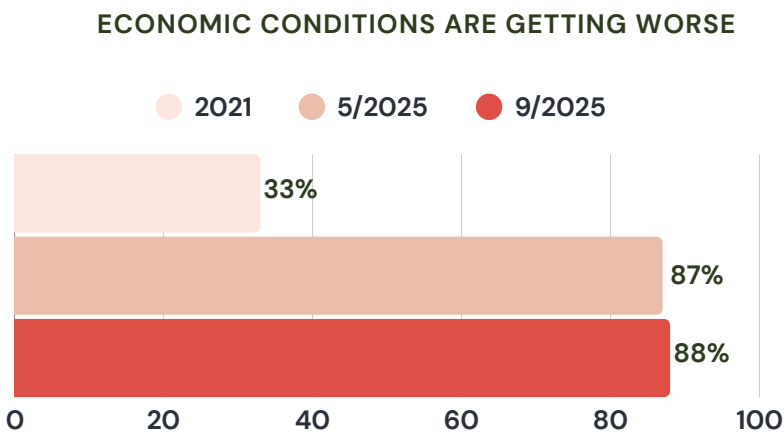

Black women voters say America is worse off today than it was 3–4 years ago

ECONOMIC CONDITIONS FOR BLACK WOMEN HAVE NOT ONLY WORSENE – THEY HAVE DETERIORATED.

Nearly all (88%) believe economic conditions in the country are getting worse.

Black women believe economic conditions are worse today than at the height of COVID–19.



PERSONAL ECONOMIC CONDITIONS ARE COLLAPSING FOR BLACK WOMEN.

Across several key indicators – from wages to employment to saving for retirement – personal economic conditions are growing worse.

While Black women are concerned about the economy, those concerns are inseparable from deeper questions of dignity and care.

In fact, their number one concern is not just money in the wallet – but the erasure of Black history.

- 83% Erasure of Black history
- 81% Impact of tariffs on costs of goods
- 77% Cost of higher education
- 77% Uncertainty about the economy
- 77% Deportation without due process
- 75% Erosion of voting rights

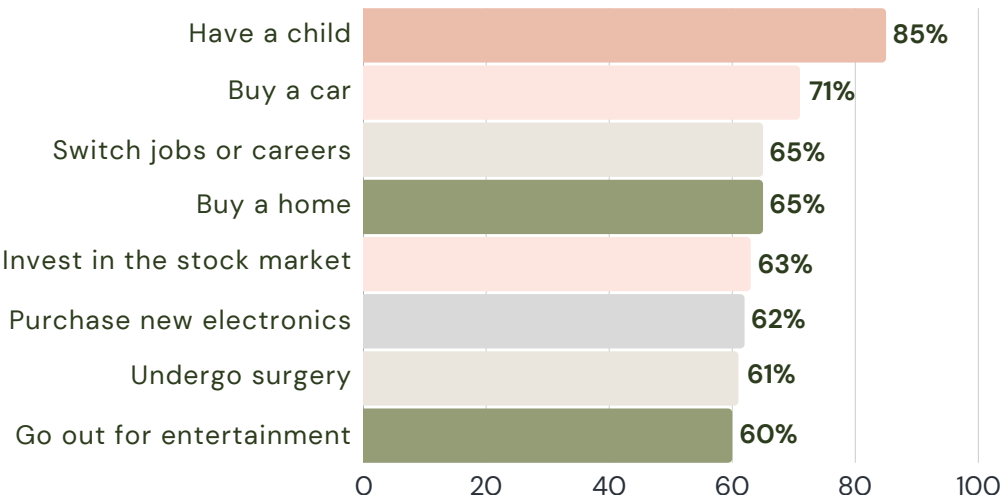


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BLACK WOMEN VOTERS ARE LIVING IN THE TENSION OF TODAY AND TOMORROW.

Because of the state of the country, they are delaying financial decisions that would secure the futures they seek. Black women are less likely to...



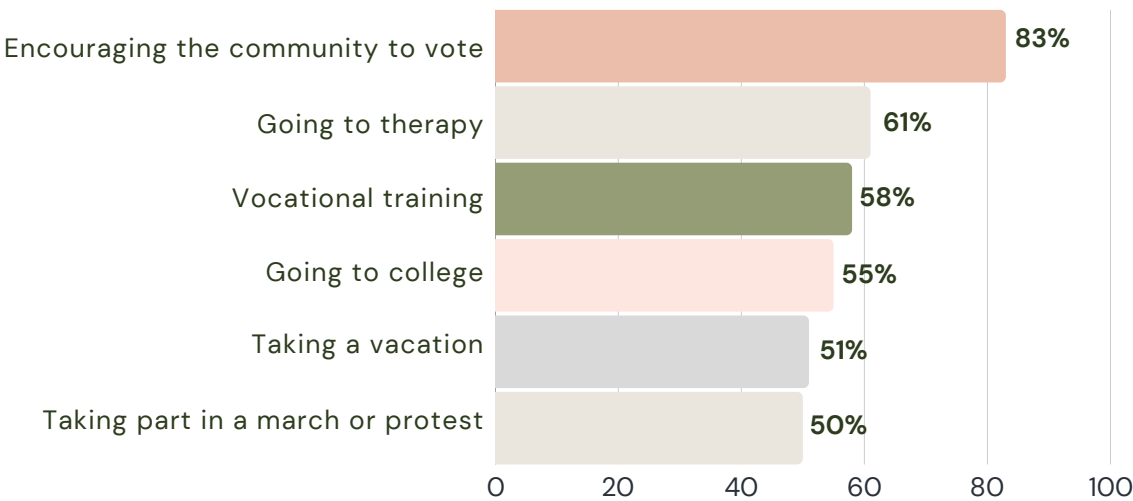
THEIR DELAYS IN FINANCIAL SPENDING TELLS US SOMETHING URGENT.

The impact is not only deeply personal – it will ripple throughout the economy.

Given the \$2 trillion in buying power in the Black community, this is not just a personal financial issue: it’s a national economic warning sign. **If Black women reduce spending, there will be an economy-wide slowdown.**

BUT BLACK WOMEN ARE NOT RETREATING. THEY ARE CONTINUING TO PRIORITIZE JOY, VOICE, AND LIVING HEALTHY LIVES.

BLACK WOMEN CONTINUE TO CALL FOR A COLLECTIVE PATH FORWARD ROOTED IN DIGNITY, WELL-BEING, AND CARE.

Their message is clear: **dignity, well-being, and care are not secondary issues. They are at the core of what will move this country forward.**

Black women voters strongly support community-centered policies that...

- 96%** Build affordable housing
- 95%** Provide a childcare tax credit
- 92%** Increase IEP funding
- 90%** Require 14 weeks of paid parental leave
- 90%** Provide student loan debt relief

These findings are from a proprietary survey conducted by brilliant corners Research & Strategies on behalf of The Highland Project. This is a survey of 701 African American women who are registered to vote. The survey was conducted by phone using professional interviewers starting on 9/3/2025 and ending on 9/14/2025.

The survey’s sample was drawn randomly from the voter file and geographically stratified for proportional representation. The data was weighted slightly to adhere to population demographics of voters in the voter file. The margin of error overall is +/- 3.7 percent, with a 95 percent confidence interval. Notably, the margin of error for sub-groups will be higher depending on the size of the sub-group sample and the size of the actual response to any given question.
